
Sea-going Experience in Earth Sciences: An undergraduate class at Columbia University

A class was designed to introduce undergraduates at Columbia with an interest in Earth Science to the excitement of going to sea and marine geophysical research environment.

We selected five undergraduates (limited by available bunks) who were either majors or minors in Earth Science to participate in the Shillington et al. Alaska cruise. They were introduced to the some of the basics concepts of what goes into conceiving, proposing, conducting and learning from a scientific research cruise. Both general background and cruise-specific lessons were included to prepare them for successfully learning from an contributing to the cruise.

The class was designed by Maya Tolstoy and co-taught with Donna Shillington. The curriculum was inspired by the technical and scientific breadth of John Diebold.
