



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Incident Details	Warnings / Lessons Learned
Scientist with extreme vertigo transferred ashore,	
seen at hospital, Rx = rest. Traveled home a few days	
later. No lost time.	
Scientist with previously known tooth infection	
transferred ashore for oral surgery in home country.	
No lost time.	
Scientist's knee buckled while walking up ship	
ladderway as ship was approaching homeport. Seen	
at hospital, Rx = knee brace for travel home. No lost	
time.	
Scientist's thumb lacerated from impact with spud	
wrench. GW MMA consulted; first aid applied	
aboard. No lost time.	
Crew member chipped a front tooth while working	
with a wrench. The wrench slipped, hitting this	
person in the tooth, causing minor chip in the tooth.	
Crew member smashed their left thumb with a	
wrench while working on a broken valve. tightening	
Crew member suffered heat exhaustion while	
chipping paint on the back deck.	
Crew member developed a urinary tract infection.	
Was seen by a doctor on shore, received fit for duty	
along with taking medication to clear up infection.	
Case of eczema which was treated onboard.	
Broken tooth while eating which led to a dental visit	
in port following cruise.	
An allergic reaction that was treated onboard.	
An inner ear infection that was treated in port with	
antibiotics.	
Crew member tripped and fell while walking on bow	
at night, injuring face and eye.	
While removing a ceiling tile to work on a fan, debris	Safety glasses were worn but safety goggles in this

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One crew member smashed two fingers on his right	
hand when tightening a bolt on the back deck.	
Wrench slipped.

Crew member hit himself in the face with a wrench	
when it slipped from a socket injuring his face/teeth.	
While tying up the ship in bad weather, crew	
member slipped and fell, injuring his knee.	
Crew member suffered an allergic reaction to a hair	
color treatment and was treated by a local doctor.
