### **U.S. ARF Revised Operations Plan Extended** Through June To Manage Risks Associated With Covid-19

On 17 March, the UNOLS office, in collaboration with the funding agencies, operators and UNOLS Council released <u>Guidance Regarding</u> <u>Rescheduling of Cruises Due to Coronavirus Impacts</u> to the UNOLS community in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. That guidance indicated operational plans would be revised for at least 30 days, essentially tying up research vessels until there was a better understanding of the impacts of the outbreak. The rate of increase in the number of COVID-19 cases lead the funding agencies, operators and UNOLS Council to issue an <u>Extended Guidance Plan</u> for the U.S. Academic Research Fleet. The updated guidance released on 30 March recommends an extension of the stand-down until 1 July 2020.

The operators, funding agencies, and UNOLS office are working diligently with the affected PIs to prioritize 2020 sea-going research. The safety of crew and science party is paramount, therefore restarting science operations must follow a carefully developed, risk-based assessment of all factors in determining when at-sea work can start again. What works for one vessel and/or project may not work for another. To help the operators and PIs navigate the process of restarting operations <u>Coronavirus (COVID-19) Considerations for Making Decisions</u> <u>Regarding Conducting Science Onboard U.S. Academic Research Fleet</u> <u>Vessels</u> was developed. This document outlines considerations, risks and mitigation for both the operators and the shipboard scientists. These considerations will be updated as more information about the virus and the pandemic becomes available.

#### **R/V Gilbert R. Mason Keel Laying**

On 3 March 2020 a keel laying ceremony was held at the Municipal Auditorium in Houma, LA for the 3rd Regional Class Research Vessel, R/V GILBERT R. MASON. The R/V MASON will be operated by the Gulf - Caribbean Oceanographic Consortium led by the University of Southern





Mississippi and the Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium (LUMCON). Many of Dr. Gilbert Mason's family members, as well as a number of dignitaries from both Mississippi and Louisiana, attended the event. Louisiana Governor John Bel Edwards attended and was one of the speakers. Dr. Mason's granddaughter, Aria Mason, the ship's sponsor, provided an inspirational keynote speech. In her speech Ms. Mason talked of how her grandfather inspired her through his passion for oceanographic research as well as his work to secure equal access to the Mississippi coast and the sea for all residents. The ceremony concluded with a Gulf Island Shipyard welder welding Ms. Mason's initials in a plate that will be affixed to the keel of R/V GILBERT R. MASON.

### UNOLS Recognizes 20 Years of USCGC HEALY Support to Artic Science

USCGC HEALY was commissioned on 10 November 1999. Over the next twenty years HEALY completed 63 science missions to the Arctic. On 16 January 2020 UNOLS formally recognized this major milestone as part of the AICC Winter Meeting held at U.S. Coast Guard Base Seattle. AICC Chair Craig Lee (UW APL) and Fleet Improvement Committee Chair Jim Swift (SIO) spoke of HEALY's accomplishments and significant contributions to Arctic science during the ceremony. A UNOLS plaque, a large photo of HEALY in the ice from a recent expedition, and a formal letter to the Commandant of the USCG recognizing the milestone were presented to the ship's Commanding Officer, CAPT Mary Ellen Durley. Five previous HEALY Commanding Officers were present for the event.
